
## A Message from Our Doctor: Changes and growth AUDIOLOGY When you speak, We Listen!

#### Desert Valley donates assistive listening devices to The Smith Center



The Smith Center for the performing arts opened in 2012. Since that time they have used what is known as an infrared system to provide hearing assistance. Infrared has limits in that it requires the user to be in direct line of sight with the transmitter. If a user is seated in a corner or turned they may not hear the sound. In addition, after six years of use the equipment was in need of repair.

Desert Valley Audiology saw the perfect opportunity to help our community. We donated two completely new FM systems to The Smith Center. One system will be permanently located in Reynolds Hall and the other is portable to allow for use in Symphony Park or in Cabaret Jazz Theatre. The advantage to an FM system is that regardless of where the user is located they will hear the sound. This allows patrons to sit in any part of the auditorium and hear the sound directly in a headset or their hearing aids, through use of a teleCoil.

### Don't let summer fun dampen your devices

Summer time can bring challenges for hearing aid wearers With the rise in allergens and wet weather, closer attention needs to be paid to maintenance and upkeep of hearing devices. For example, increased allergens can clog microphone ports in hearing aids, so be sure to clean hearing aids regularly and replace covers of mic ports when necessary.

Along with allergens, summer is accompanied by heat, humidity, rain and extreme temperature changes. Moisture is the enemy of hearing aids, as it can build up in the tubing,

damage the microphone and receiver, and cause static. Make sure to wear a hat or use an umbrella when going out in the rain. And in addition to regular cleaning, use a hearing aid dehumidifier overnight or anytime your hearing aids are exposed to excess moisture.



## Are your migraines causing hearing loss?

Studies are showing there's a link between hearing loss and migraine headaches. No matter how well you think you hear, it's important for to get an annual hearing evaluation. But, if you suffer from migraine headaches it may be even more important to keep close check on your hearing health.



Do you live in a noisy world? If you work in a loud environment or tend to have a very active social life, directional microphone technology can help you make sense of that noise. The dual microphones help you better understand speech in noisy environments.



Do you have dexterity issues? The smaller the device, the smaller the controls. If you struggle with fine motor skills you will likely benefit from wearing a behind-the-ear (BTE) or a larger custom style. Features like the battery door and volume control will be larger on these devices making it easier for you to adjust.
